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Overcoming the Greatest Loss

Jennifer, age 56, was born and raised in Prince Georges County, Maryland. "I was the oldest of three children," recalls Jennifer. "My mom and dad were together, but my dad was a physically abusive alcoholic. Occasionally, the police would have to respond to the violence. My parents would separate and get back together, perpetuating the cycle."

"School was hard even though I was a good student. When I was in the fifth grade, my mom had a nervous breakdown, and my brother, sister, and I were sent to a foster home. I cared for my brother and sister, constantly feeling I needed to protect them. We had been attending Calverton Baptist Church, which was my rock during this time, but we switched to another place of worship. One day, after attending this new church, my father was convinced that God would heal my bad eyesight. He instructed me to remove my glasses and pray, and Jesus would heal me. At the end of the day, when my sight had not become clear, I thought I must have done something terrible for Jesus not to heal me."

"In high school, things went smoother. Even though I was hurting, I put on a persona of no worries. I hung out with all types of kids. Only my closest friends knew about my family issues. This helped me hide my shame. I was popular but couldn't go to Homecoming because of our church's values, and I couldn't go to dances, the movies, or listen to secular music. "

"It was like I was living a double life. I just wanted to be an ordinary girl! Because I struggled with my father, I had no proper concept of male relationships. I got engaged at age 18 to a guy everyone loved, but I canceled the engagement due to abuse. During my life, every time I was a victim, my dad did not defend me, and this resulted in shame."

"Soon after, I met my ex-husband, got pregnant, married, and had a daughter. We gave our lives to the Lord and became fully involved in the church. Four years later, we had a daughter, followed by our son Micheal three and a half years later. Neither of us knew how to have a successful marriage, and we began to grow apart. By age 30, we went through a messy divorce. Up until this time, I never drank! One day, I had a Bacardi and Coke and exclaimed, 'Where have you been my whole life?' I began drinking to get drunk and separate from my pain by becoming numb."

Barry, while on the excursion, remarked: "Being out on the open water provided a sense of freedom as the sunset was peaceful and serene. It is amazing to realize that a place such as this exists within the city of Baltimore."









Overcoming the Greatest Loss

"I became sloppy and started losing my family. I lost my job working at a high school. I did not think I was an alcoholic; I could drink a lot. Soon, I just partied and did what I wanted to do. The only thing that I cared about was alcohol. Nobody was in charge of me except me and my drinking. I started dating a guy who introduced me to cocaine, which was amazing. It gave me energy, and I loved how it made me feel. I did not have a cut-off switch, and soon, I wanted more and more."

"I got my first DUI with my son in the car, and three and a half months later, I got my second. My life was falling apart. We moved from home to home, and the kids kept changing schools. They started living with their father, and I lost everything. In 2020, my son Michael died of an overdose when I was six weeks sober. I prayed to the Lord to not leave me because I did not know how to be set free from my addictions."

"In August 2022, I was at a rehab and returned drunk. A counselor named Katie took care of me until 1 a.m. I stayed forty days and detoxed from alcohol. She wanted me to go to Helping Up Mission (HUM), and my response was, 'No, thank you! Are you crazy?' After I left, I relapsed badly, and once again, Katie implored me to give HUM a try, and I reluctantly agreed."

"I came in kicking and screaming. I initially felt overwhelmed and soon found a sense of peace when I saw scripture on the walls of this beautiful place. HUM was not what I expected and having no phone for the first sixty days was wicked. I later learned that the staff thought I would not make it, but I succeeded. I reflected on my twenty years of drinking and all the losses that came with it. Today, I finally admit that I am an alcoholic. I have also learned to grieve. I receive healing from my trauma, low self-esteem, rejection from men, and shame."

"I want to work in recovery, helping women and men who have lost a child to addiction. I want to help them see that they can survive their ultimate loss through Christ, Who gives you strength, one breath, one step, one hour, one day at a time. The joy of the Lord has been my strength to be me without alcohol. Today, I believe in myself."

"To the donors, thank you for the vision of this place and for the opportunity for women to come and take back their lives. We can find recovery in Christ. Long before I ever came to HUM, some woman's name was "on the bricks" of this beautiful building, and now my name is on one, and after me, another name will be added. Thank You!"

He was always moving through her story but as the layers of movement began to unfold, an even more stunning thing happened; she began to see the desires of her heart become a reality through her recovery process.

The words above that Jennifer was able to speak in her mind, heart and soul have begun to encourage, strengthen and challenge others; both those we serve and staff that are walking alongside her and others each day. The road to recovery is recovery. The road to healing is healing. The road to getting through grief is to grieve.

As Jennifer and others at Helping Up Mission are able to give their lives over to God or their higher power, that is when the healing can start to begin both today and all the tomorrows that are to follow. As the fall season approaches, there is change that happens both with the foliage of the leaves on the trees, the briskness of the air that begins to settle in and a time that heads toward change. Just as seasons change as time passes so do seasons in our own lives change as we are presented with new situations and how we deal and cope with them.

Jennifer has chosen to "Today, I believe in myself". Do you believe that recovery is possible every day? As each of us delights in where God has us for this moment in time and takes the time to say "thank you"; He will meet us right there. When He does, our days that we see as todays become the tomorrows and then they become a reflection of the yesterdays that bring us to a fuller sense of recovery. Everyday.
